John Carty has quietly but certainly become one of Irish music's leading players. An astonishing fiddler, the London-born musician is equally gifted at banjo, flute and tenor guitar. His musical sparring partners include such trad giants as Matt Molloy and Arty McGlynn and he is now part of Patrick Street. Hear why.

John has been named Ireland's prestigious TG4 Traditional Musician of the Year (2003). He is recognized as one of Ireland's finest traditional musicians. He joins previous acclaimed winners Matt Molloy, Tommy Peoples, Mary Bergin, Máire Ní Chathasaigh and Paddy Keenan, all of whom are considered to be the leading exponents of their instruments within the Irish tradition. Fine company for a fine musician.

He joined the Irish supergroup Patrick Street in 2004, and awarded the Irish Echo's Top 10 CD of the Year in 2005 for his CD, *I Will if I Can*. In 2007 he recorded *On the Fly* with Patrick Street and released *Pathway to the Well* with Chieftains flautist Matt Molloy. A busy man!

Born in London, fiddler John Carty has established himself among the elite in Irish traditional music and as a staunch supporter of its preservation. He developed his love for fiddle, banjo, and flute, all of which he has mastered, through his multi-instrumentalist father who was a member of the Glenside Ceili Band in London in the 1960's.

Now settled in Boyle, County Roscommon, John has been touring all over Europe with his band At the Racket as well as in the US with Patrick Street. You Gotta Have Harp is booking solo tours for John in the US and will be working with Loftus Music to book additional gigs with his fiddle buddy Kevin Burke.

Teaching Credentials: John teaches part time at University of Limerick Irish World Academy of Music and Dance and at summer schools and festivals worldwide.

In 2011 John released *The Crimson Path*, collaboration with Sligo poet Ann Joyce, which is a CD of original poetry and music for which John composed all the music. This was quickly followed by the release of *At Complete Ease*, a duet fiddle album with Brian Rooney from Kiltclogher, Co Leitrim. This CD has already been described as one of the all times greats of duet playing.

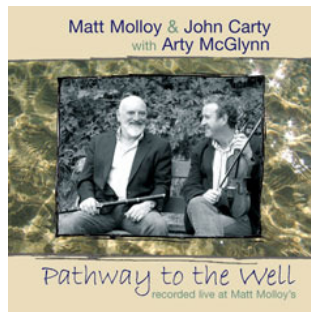
Apart from performing and recording John has also been instrumental in getting many other musicians to record and has produced many albums such as Brian Rooney's acclaimed albums 'The Godfather' and 'From Leitrim to London'.

John has recently put together a new eight piece band, The John Carty Festival band which was launched in summer 2012 and has since played at festivals in Ireland and the UK. Over the last eighteen months John has been part of the Co Leitrim Traditional group in residency scheme which comprises of himself and two other legends of traditional music namely Seamus Begley on accordion and vocals, and Donál Lunny on bouzouki and guitar. They have recently launched the album, *Leitrim Equation 3*, which includes many Leitrim guests they met during the residency.

John performs regularly with **Chieftains' flautist Matt Molloy**. He is also touring with re-formed super group, **Patrick Street** in Ireland and the US, which includes legendary musicians Andy Irvine, Kevin Burke, Jackie Daly and Ged Foley. He has also appeared as a special guest with the Chieftains and De Danaan.

This "Well" Doesn't Run Dry

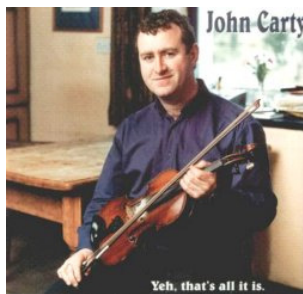

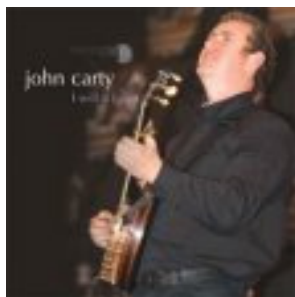
Yeh, That's All It Is

At It Again



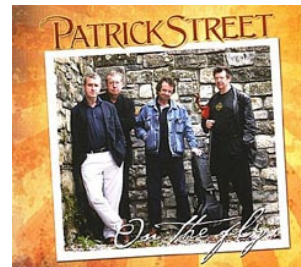
